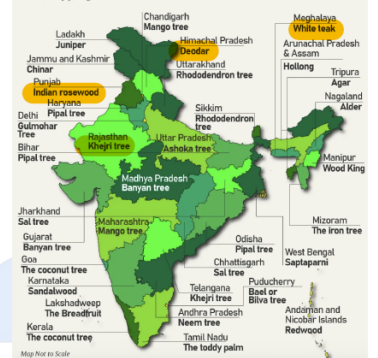
State Trees

Why in news: Every Indian state has a state tree.

- **National tree of India is the Banyan tree**, sacred in Hinduism, Buddhism (Kashyapa Buddha) and Jainism (Neminatha); it is also the state tree of Gujarat and MP.
- **Pipal tree**, under which **Gautama Buddha** attained enlightenment and linked to **Parshvanath (23rd Jain Tirthankara)**, is the **state tree of Haryana, Bihar, and Odisha**.
- **Sal tree** is the **state tree of Chhattisgarh and Jharkhand**; mentioned in **Ramayana and Buddha's birth and death**; also linked to **Manusuvrata (20th Tirthankara)**.
- **Ashoka tree**, sacred in the **Ramayana**, is the **state tree of UP**, and its flower is the **state flower of Odisha**.
- **Khejri or Shami tree**, linked to **Mahabharata, warrior traditions, and Harappan seals**, is the **state tree of Telangana and Rajasthan**. **Mango tree**, used in rituals, is the **state tree of Maharashtra and Chandigarh**.
- **Gulmohar tree**, though introduced only 200 years ago, is regarded as **Delhi's state tree**; in **Kerala Christianity**, its red flowers symbolize **Jesus' blood** (Kaalvarippoo).
- **In South India**:
 - **Neem tree** (sacred to goddesses): **Andhra Pradesh**; **Bael tree** (sacred to Shiva): **Puducherry**; **Toddy palm** (linked to **Balaram**): **Tamil Nadu**; **Coconut tree**: **Goa and Kerala**; **Sandalwood tree** (used for **Vishnu worship**): **Karnataka**.
- **In the Himalayan region**: **Deodar** (linked to **Shiva**): **Himachal Pradesh**; **Chinar** (sacred to **Sufis**): **Jammu & Kashmir**; **Juniper** (used in **Tibetan Buddhism**): **Ladakh**; **Rhododendron** (offered to **Nandadevi**): **Sikkim and Uttarakhand**.
- **In Northeast and Islands**: **Hollong**: **Assam** and **Arunachal Pradesh**; **Alder**: **Nagaland**; **Wood King**: **Manipur**; **White Teak**: **Meghalaya**; **Redwood**: **Andaman and Nicobar Islands**; **Iron tree** (sacred in **Buddhism**): **Mizoram**; **Agar** (used for **perfume**): **Tripura**; **Saptaparni** (used for **blackboards**, linked to **Santiniketan**): **West Bengal**; **Breadfruit tree** (linked to **Polynesian seafarers**): **Lakshadweep**.

Khejri Trees

- **Successful agitation by saints and Bishnoi community members in Bikaner. Khejri is the official State tree of Rajasthan**, designated in view of its immense value to the desert ecosystem and rural economy.
- **Prosopis cineraria, known as the 'Wonder Tree of the Thar', is crucial for arid ecosystem survival. It acts as a sand dune stabilizer, nitrogen-fixer, and source of fodder/food ('Sangri').**
- **It faces threats from solar projects.**

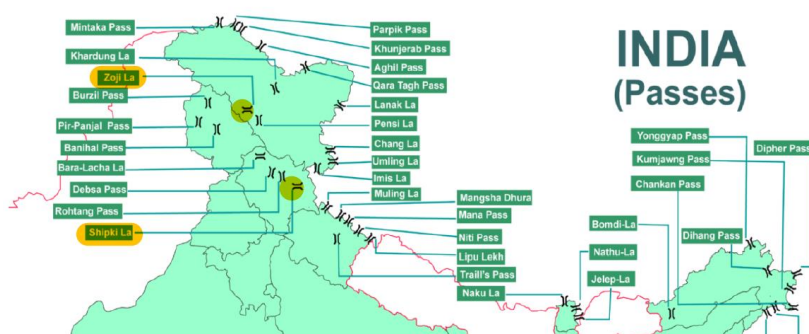

- There is **no dedicated legislation** in India on withholding/withdrawing life-sustaining treatment. But SC's judgment and these guidelines make it clear that **withholding/withdrawing life-sustaining treatment is legal**.
- SC in **Common Cause vs Union of India (2018)** recognised **right to die with dignity under Article 21**.
- Withdrawal of life-sustaining treatment takes place either through informed refusal by a patient with decision-making capacity or through an advance medical directive ('living will'). SC in its 2018 judgment also laid down **framework** for making advance medical directives or living wills and simplified it in 2023.
- Living wills are written documents made by a **person of age 18 years or older** with decision-making capacity, expressing their will on how they would wish to be treated if they lose such capacity.
- It should detail **at least two surrogate decision-makers** — anyone whom the person trusts, from family to neighbours, who can make decisions on behalf of the person if they lose decision-making capacity. It becomes legal when it is signed in presence of executor and 2 witnesses, and attested before a notary or gazetted officer.
- Hospital must notify decisions on withdrawing life-sustaining treatment to the local judicial magistrate.
- **Government Medical College Hospital in Kerala's Kollam district** opened a 'Living Will Information Counter' to spread awareness & became the **first hospital** in the country to establish such a counter.

- The distinction between **"active" and "passive" euthanasia** goes beyond the binary of "act versus omission", said **SC judge**. The distinction lies in the **source of the harm that leads to death**, not merely the **nature of the conduct**.
- **Active euthanasia** involves causing death by introducing a new, external agency of harm such as a lethal injection. In such cases, death is not the result of the patient's underlying illness but of an intervention. **Illegal in India**.
- **Passive euthanasia** means allowing death to occur. By withdrawing or withholding life support, the physician is not

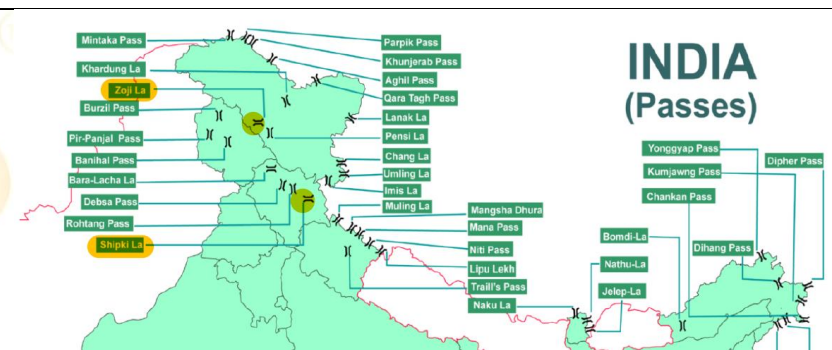

Monroe–Donroe Doctrine

- President **Monroe's Doctrine** established U.S. **hegemony** in its backyard, carving out a **sphere of influence**.

In 2024, China Concord Resources Corporation, a private company, signed agreement with PDVSA, Venezuela's state oil company, to develop **two oilfields in Lake Maracaibo** (South America's largest lake and a major petroleum-producing basin. Known as the "lightning capital of the world," it experiences the unique Catatumbo lightning phenomenon. The lake connects to the Caribbean Sea via the Tablazo Strait and is technically an estuary).

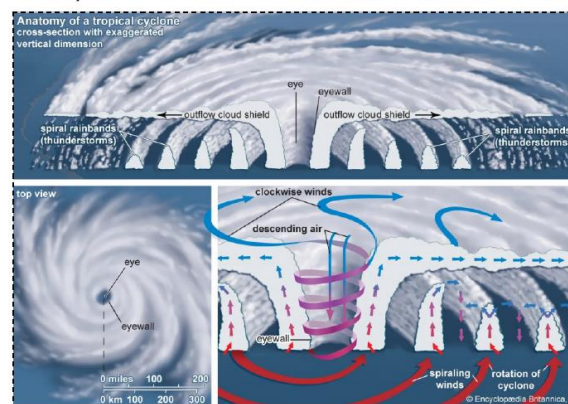

Who names cyclones & why?

Cyclone names are decided by WMO/ESCAP, a group of 13 countries including India, Bangladesh, Oman, Pakistan, Myanmar, Sri Lanka, Thailand and the Maldives.

Names are chosen in rotation. Montha was suggested by Thailand to help in clear communication and preparedness.

Why the Bay of Bengal?

Its funnel-like shape and warmer waters make the Bay more prone to cyclones.

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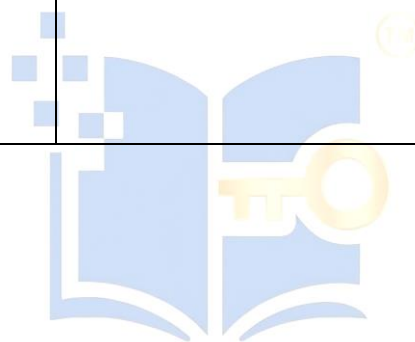

It would require validation by two doctors, a psychiatrist, a senior lawyer, and a social worker. • Ministry of Health released draft Guidelines for Withdrawal of Life Support in Terminally Ill Patients to operationalise the Supreme Court's 2018 and 2023 orders on right to die with dignity for all Indians. • Guidelines include: - Setting up of Primary and Secondary Medical Boards at level of hospital, which will determine when further medical treatment may not be beneficial to a terminally ill patient; - Nomination of doctors by district CMO or equivalent to hospital-level Secondary Medical Boards, which will confirm or reject opinion of Primary Medical Boards. Secondary Medical Board members must be different from those on the Primary Medical Board. - There is no dedicated legislation in India on withholding/withdrawing life-sustaining treatment. But SC's judgment and these guidelines make it clear that withholding/withdrawing life-sustaining treatment is legal. - SC in Common Cause vs Union of India (2018) recognised right to die with dignity under Article 21. - Withdrawal of life-sustaining treatment takes place either through informed refusal by a patient with decision-making capacity or through an advance medical directive ('living will').
